Employment


Nonprofits in Santa Barbara County employ 15,300 residents: That's 7.5% of our workforce!

- **58%** predict they'll increase staff in the coming year.
- 81% hired new staff last year.
- ~70% say volunteers play a significant role in achieving their mission.

Nonprofits identified concerns for workforce recruitment and retention such as cost of living and employee burnout.



Locations Where Surveyed Nonprofits Provide Services



One County, Diverse Communities

North County has greater numbers of lowincome households and more extreme poverty than South County. However, South County has more nonprofits and more substantial assets per capita compared to both Mid- and North County.

- **South County:** 1 nonprofit for every 353 residents.
- North County: 1 nonprofit for every 1,300 residents*

*Several nonprofits based in South County serve the entire county, e.g. Foodbank of Santa Barbara County: HQ in Goleta, majority service in Santa Maria.

Santa Barbara Foundation Recommendations

Invest in Nonprofit Workforce

Provide support to meet increasing program costs and build capacity.

Increase Capacity in Mid- & North County Where majority of need exists, yet nonprofit assets are underrepresented.

Prioritize Flexible Funding

Empower nonprofits to devote more time to their mission, not fundraising.

Advance Diversity, Equity, Inclusion & Access Address significant disparities in representation.

Cultivate Trust, Collaboration & Innovation

Support existing collaborations and new, crosssector approaches to our communities' most challenging problems.


Housing affordability is a key factor in the strength of our nonprofit sector.



Financial Health of the Sector

- 81% of nonprofits saw demand for services increase in the last year
- 79% increased salaries to try to keep up with cost of living
- 49% saw their investment values decrease

Diversity, Equity, Inclusion & Access

Leadership and board makeup across the sector does not reflect county demographics. Nonprofits recognize the importance of addressing representation concerns.

Findings show that of surveyed nonprofits:

- **53%** sought community input to better understand needs of those they serve
- 72% implemented practices to build more diverse boards
